Course Description

Theatre History II is a survey of the history of Western theatre from the closing of the theatres in England in 1642 to the present; with a brief introduction to the theatre of the East.

The course is for non-theatre majors and minors only.

There are no prerequisites for this course.

Learning Outcomes

Through this course students will:

- Distinguish between different types of performance and performance spaces, as well as the structure of plays and different dramatic forms.
- Identify and discuss different historical periods in theatre, contemporary trends and movements in theatre as indebted to historical predecessors, as well as, articulate ways in which theatre has reflected and affected society.
- Operate analytically within a group of peers in order to analyze theatrical diversity and theatre as a window into the conscience of a specific society.
- Recognize and appreciate theatre as a form of personal, often controversial, expression; and
 judge the merit of personal expression in comparison with its possible social and political
 ramifications.
- Challenge and assess their position as a global citizen by examining different global traditions in performance; and evaluate the ethics of art without a political or personal agenda.

Written Assignments

Detailed instructions for written assignments will be posted on eCampus. All homework assignments are due before class begins and must be submitted online through eCampus in doc or pdf formats. In-class assignments must be turned in at the end of the class session. Late assignments will not be accepted except in the case of an excused absence.

Assessments

You will be responsible for taking online quizzes and exams through eCampus as homework. Quizzes and exams *are due BEFORE CLASS begins* on the date specified on the syllabus. You are welcome to use your textbook and notes from class while taking quizzes and exams, but these are the only approved resources. Please adhere to the Aggie Honor Code and refrain from using any unauthorized materials or assistance from classmates. Tests and quizzes will cover the assigned reading as well as lecture material.

Many students want an A because it reflects a high level of academic competence and accomplishment; it means you put a lot of work into mastering the material of the class. However, some students are subject to external pressures brought on by student visas, scholarships, requirements for a major, academic probation, or graduation, and desperately "need" to achieve a certain grade. The onus for receiving the grade you need is on you, the student who earns it. YOU determine what your grade will be (not me) based on your performance over the course of the semester and the work you put into the class. If there's a lot riding on your grade, start working NOW to achieve the grade you want. Pay attention in class and avoid distractions, do your homework, take notes (beyond just what's written on the slides), regularly review your notes, form a study group, start studying for tests early rather than procrastinating, begin your assignments early and put effort into them, and feel free to come see

me in office hours or schedule an appointment if need any help or if you just want to make sure you're on the right track. At the end of every semester, panicked students contact me when there is frankly nothing I can do to change their grade, because the student already earned that grade based on their performance over the course of the semester. Not only is it unfair to your peers to ask for special consideration at the end of the semester, it's also unnecessary if you've been proactive about your work and grades throughout the course. If you contact me at the end of the semester to ask for any sort of change to your grade, I will not answer your email except to cut and paste this paragraph into my reply.

Extra Credit

Students have the opportunity to attend one live theatrical production over the course of the semester for extra credit. Upon seeing the production, in its entirety, you will submit a 1-2 page critical analysis of the production. See eCampus for specific instructions.

Team-based Learning

In this course we will be using a Team-based Learning (TBL) structure. TBL is a form of small-group learning that emphasizes student preparation out of class and application of knowledge in class. Students will be organized strategically into diverse teams that work together throughout the semester. Students will prepare by reading prior to class and completing an online quiz. In class assignments will allow each group to demonstrate application of course concepts from the reading assignments.

Attendance

The best way to be successful in this course is to attend class. If you miss class due to an excused absence you will be provided an opportunity to make up any missed assignments or quizzes. I will not accept late assignments without an excused absence. If you do miss a class for any reason you are responsible for obtaining notes and information regarding assignments from your classmates.

As per University policy, a student must notify me in writing (an acknowledged e-mail is acceptable) prior to the absence if possible, but no later than the end of the second working day after the absence in order to be excused. In most cases I will ask for documentation substantiating the reason for the absence. You must provide the documentation within one week of the last day of absence in order to be excused.
